FROM THE PASTOR

Every election year we are often tempted to get caught up in the moment. The news, the stories, the changing details from day to day, the debates, the rhetoric on both sides. For some, it is exhausting for others exhilarating. Perhaps for most of us, a bit of both. But as Christians we are blessed to remain rooted in something that does not change from day to day, week to week, or year to year. Our Lord is the same yesterday, today, and tomorrow. He still reigns in heaven, still hears our prayers, still cares for us, still forgives us by the shed blood of Christ. None of this has changed, none of this will change until he comes again in glory.

What I have briefly illustrated is actually the Lutheran dichotomy referred to as "The Two Kingdoms". To make this as simple as possible, God operates in our lives both in the "kingdom" of the church and through the "kingdom" of the state. Remember what Jesus said to Pilate when Pilate appeals to his own authority? "You would have no authority over me at all unless it had been give you from above" (John 19:11). Pilate, though he believed he had authority of his own was still only operating under the authority of God. As it says in the Small Catechism's Table of Duties "Everyone must submit himself to the governing authorities, for there is no authority except that which God has established. The authorities that exist have been established by God." God operates through the state in what is called the kingdom of the left. This kingdom is a kingdom of power, one which we are all acquainted with when we pay taxes or when we make note of the speed limit to avoid getting a ticket. It operates completely under the law, you cannot appeal to a earthly judge by saying, "Yes, I was speeding but what about the forgiveness of Jesus?". While we never negate our Christian duty to treat others with forgiveness, we do acknowledge that civic society operates differently than the church. At church we confess our complete guilt before God, that we deserve nothing on account of our sins, and yet we appeal to God that we be completely forgiven on account of Jesus. As citizens we cannot make that appeal, we can appeal only to our own innocence or guilt, and the judge must determine what is true or not. Like it or not, we as Christians live with one foot in the kingdom of the left (civic realm) and the other foot in the kingdom of the right (heavenly realm). This dichotomy

helps us understand two things. First, we understand that our civil rulers are all likewise under the authority of God. Therefore, if we refuse to follow the law or pay taxes or if we refuse to pray for our rulers we dishonor God. For God is the one who gave them the authority that they exercise. We are called as Christians to live a peaceful and quiet life which means being a good citizen who operate within the confines of the law and who pray for their rulers for health and to act according to God's Holy Word. It is not up to us to make things go the way we want, and it need not be, since it is God who is ultimately in control and who reigns over the kingdom of the left.

Secondly, this dichotomy gives us an appreciation for the fact that God deals with us by his grace. We cannot make an appeal to the Gospel when standing before an earthly judge. But we can and must appeal to the Gospel when standing before our heavenly judge. God created both realms for different purposes. For the sake or order and peace do we have earthly judges and rulers. But when the earth gives way and all earthly kingdoms fall, there will yet be our heavenly judge who is perfectly just and righteous. When he comes again he will judge the living and the dead. For the faithful who have washed their robes in the blood of the Lamb they will come before this judge with pure white garments, perfectly innocent on account of the blood of Jesus (Revelation 7:14). May God grant this to all of us who await his coming, and give us hope and peace as we wait.

ABOUT THE "GESIMAS"

On February 16, we enter into a season of the church year before Lent called the season of Septuagesima or "Pre-Lent." This is made up of the three Sundays (Septuagesima, Sexagesima, Quinquagesima) which come between the feast of Transfiguration and Ash Wednesday. The names are Latin for the number of days before Easter. Quinquagesima is exactly 50 days before Easter, Sexagesima 57 days, and Septuagesima is 64 days before Easter. This season serves as a transition between the celebratory season of Epiphany and the penitential season of Lent. During this time, we omit the *Gloria in Excelsis* and the *Alleluia* as we prepare ourselves for the penitential season of Lent.

STEWARDSHIP CORNER - FEBRUARY 2025

February 2 – Presentation of Our Lord and Purification of Mary/Candlemas

Luke 2:24 – "[They went] to offer a sacrifice according to what is said in the Law of the Lord, 'a pair of turtledoves, or two young pigeons." Throughout the Old and New Testaments, God gives us the pattern of proportional giving. If you look at Leviticus 12, you'll see that the sacrifice for purification was either a lamb or a pair of birds if the family had no means to buy a lamb. God calls us to give in proportion to how He has blessed us — and of course Jesus sets the pattern by giving not only a portion, but His all.

February 9 – Transfiguration

Matthew 17:8 – "And when they lifted up their eyes, they saw no one but Jesus only." Moses and Elijah point to Jesus, and speak about Jesus and His sacrifice, and then they are happy to fade into the background. They know that what we need is Jesus. With our eyes focused on Him and Him alone, the rest of our lives comes into focus. He is primary, all else secondary. When that order is right in our lives, things truly fall into place. Or as Jesus Himself said, "Seek first the kingdom of God and all these things will be added unto you."

February 16 – Septuagesima

Matthew 20:9 – "And when those hired about the eleventh hour came, each of them received a denarius." That's not what they were expecting! The generosity of God is surprising because we are often so tightfisted. But the Lord gives out of His grace, better than we could deserve or even hope for. Living a godly life means living in imitation of God — and surely one of the foundations of God's being is His surprising generosity. How is the Lord calling you to generous living in His image?

February 23 – Sexagesima

Luke 8:11 – "The seed is the word of God." The plant begins as a seed — and everything in the church begins with the Word. "In the beginning ... the Word was with God" (John 1:1). "He saved us ... by the washing of regeneration and renewal of the Holy Spirit" (Titus 3:5). "The word of our God will stand forever" (Is. 40:8). We never outgrow our need to hear the Word of God. We will never achieve such greatness that we don't need the blessings of God's Word. Rather, the Christian life is one of always striving to conform our lives to God's Word to live out the truth of our Baptisms, that we are God's children by the power of His Word.

<u>LIFE THOUGHTS FOR LUTHERANS –</u> <u>FEBRUARY 2025</u>

February 2 – Purification of Mary/Presentation of Our Lord – Ever since sinfulness first afflicted creation, labor and delivery shed a mother's blood. The Law of the Lord laments that this echo and threat of death operates right where human life emerges from. So He intervenes with atonement to preserve that precious life. And Jesus embodies this opposition to abortion from the very beginning (Luke 2:22-24).

February 9 – Transfiguration of Our Lord – God has a habit of hiding great glory in ordinary and otherwise unfit settings. So, in thirty-something manual laborer Jesus, the whole fullness of deity dwells bodily (Matthew 17:2, 5). Through bloody crucifixion, forgiveness and salvation sneak in. Everyday syllables, tap water, bits of bread, and sips of wine smuggle everlasting life. And frightened bellies, frozen labs, nursing homes, and hospitalized comas cradle priceless treasures bearing God's own image.

February 16 – Septuagesima – Our Almighty Maker has blessed us with bodies for enjoyment. He has entrusted them to our control (1 Corinthians 9:26-27), but this means more than the mere "my body, my choice" indulgence of appetites. The greater gratification comes from receiving and serving even the least neighbor (1 Corinthians 9:22). Who are we to lie silent about the sanctity of life and thereby withhold the divine invitation to such a delightful discipline?

February 23 – Sexagesima – Surprise pregnancy and terminal diagnosis confront us with our own weakness. It even leads some to exclude embryos or incapacitated persons from humankind and execute them because of their weakness. Almighty God promises, "My power is made perfect precisely in your weaknesses." His grace radiates in human frailty, and the blessings He brings in every life more than make up for what we cannot.
