From the Pastor....

The Sacrament of the Altar: Who receives this sacrament worthily? (part II)

Fasting and bodily preparation are certainly fine outward training. But that person is truly worthy and well prepared who has faith in these words: "Given and shed for you for the forgiveness of sins."

But anyone who does not believe these words or doubts them is unworthy and unprepared, for the words "for you" require all hearts to believe.

With Luther's closing words here, we see as we began to examine in last month's article that receiving the Lord's Supper must not be assumed to be a blessing for everyone. Paul's warning and explanation in I Corinthians 11 reminded us last month that a careful examination of Jesus' institution of this sacrament and also of one's own sin is required for all who would properly participate in this gift. Along with Ignatius's description of Holy Communion as the "medicine of immortality," we can see a number of helpful points as we come to the end of the catechism.

As we consider this type of language, we do well to look also at this portion of Wisconsin's state law regarding prescription drugs and devices: "...No person may dispense any prescribed drug or device except upon the prescription order of a practitioner." When He instituted His gift of the Lord's Supper, He made things quite clear. He "...took bread, and after blessing it broke it and gave it to the disciples, and said, 'Take, eat; this is my body.' And He took a cup, and when He had given thanks He gave it to them, saying, 'Drink of it, all of you, for this is my blood of the covenant, which is poured out for many for the forgiveness of sins" (Matthew 26:26-28).

As Lutherans, we confess by faith that in this sacrament our Lord renews the baptismal promise delivered to us by God's grace through water and the Word, and that by eating and drinking the bread and wine—that is, Jesus' true body and blood—we receive with certainty the forgiveness He offers. The old saying is true, "actions speak louder than words," and when we go forward to participate in Holy Communion, we are confessing faith in Jesus Christ as our Savior, in His Word with which He instituted this sacrament as it points us to His completed and perfect sacrifice, in our own need for forgiveness as we bear the fruits of repentance worked in our lives through the Holy Spirit, and in the teachings of the church where we hold membership. Not every Christian can

agree with this confession, and as we reviewed last month, that means not every Christian would be blessed by taking the Lord's Supper against Christ's own prescription and institution. This is what is behind the Biblical practice of "closed communion," which is found in a majority of Christian churches throughout history and the present.

For reference, here is a short listing of the different views of Holy Communion with respect to what it is, what it does, and how it is properly understood according to a number of denominations:

Eastern Orthodox: "A believer under the forms of bread and wine, partakes of the very Body and Blood of Christ, to everlasting salvation."

Reformed: "The Lord's Supper is a sacrament, wherein...[Christ's] death is showed forth, and the worthy receives are, not after a corporal and carnal manner, but by faith, made partakers of His body and blood."

Anabaptist: "We also confess and observe the breaking of bread, or Supper, as the Lord Jesus Christ before His suffering instituted it with bread and wine, and observed and ate with His apostles, commanding them to observe it in remembrance of Him."

Roman Catholic: "Through consecration of the bread and wine there comes about a conversion of the whole substance of the bread into the substance of the body of Christ our Lord, and of the whole substance of the wine into the substance of His blood."

Baptist: "We believe in...the Lord's Supper, in which the members of the Church, by the sacred use of bread and wine, are to commemorate together the dying love of Christ."

Wesleyan: "The body of Christ is given, taken, and eaten in the Supper only after a heavenly and spiritual manner."

Liberal Church Bodies: Liberal Christians, strongly influenced by rationalism, usually don't believe in miracles. Therefore, they don't believe Christ gives His body and blood for the forgiveness of sins in the Lord's Supper.

The three most common views among denominations today are that of a "memorial meal," which places the Lord's Supper into the realm of symbolism or limits "spiritual" presence of Christ; that of "transubstantiation" which claims that there is no longer bread and wine but only Christ's body and blood at the altar as a result of His Word and also the ability of the priest to bring change to the elements as a result of his ordination; and that of the "real presence" of Christ as He offers us His true body and blood in, with, and under the bread and the wine for the forgiveness of our sins and the strengthening of our faith. As Lutherans, we recognize the problems that come with those first two views and the amount of importance it puts on the sinful human beings involved. Instead, we lean on Jesus' own Word and testimony, and while we cannot fully explain or comprehend this divine mystery, we take it on faith and say "amen" as we eat and drink His body and blood.

Though it is a popular notion that sharing the Lord's Supper is a sharing of love, we see through God's Word that communing at any congregation is not a right to be assumed or demanded but instead a privilege based on preparation. At St. John's the tradition is to commune our 8th Grade students and new members after they have gone through the Rite of Confirmation, by which they have publicly confessed that what is taught and believed here is what they themselves believe as well. Part of the promises made in that rite include the promise to live according to God's Word, and when that is not taking place, the pastor is to address the matter and perhaps call for a temporary break in a participation of the Lord's Supper until the fruits of repentance are visible.

God's blessings as you continue to study His Word, Luther's *Small Catechism*, and the very faith He gives us by His grace. There is no better place to be for any sinful person than in the Word each day and in the Lord's house as He gathers us in the Divine Service around these gifts and truths every Sunday!

NEW VANCO MOBILE GIVING APP

St. John's is pleased to announce that we have an upgraded mobile app! Vanco, our eGiving provider, has launched an updated mobile app called Vanco Mobile Faith.

This new mobile app will be replacing GivePlus Mobile. Current GivePlus Mobile users will need to download the new Vanco Mobile app to access your giving account. However, your user name and password, along with any recurring giving that you have set up will have automatically transferred over to the new Vanco Mobile app. With Vanco Mobile Faith, you can send a one-time donation or set up recurring gifts.

Downloading the new Vanco Mobile is easy! Head over to the App Store or Google Play to download Vanco Mobile for free.

Be sure to download this app soon, as GivePlus Mobile will be retired as of September 30, 2021.

To give using Vanco Mobile, follow these seven easy steps:

- 1. Search for our church by entering St Johns Lutheran
- 2. Do not use any punctuation, and it is case sensitive
- 3. Log in using your GivePlus Mobile user name and password if you have one, otherwise create a new account
- 4. Select your gift amount, fund, and frequency
- 5. Enter your payment method
- 6. Choose whether you want to cover processing fees
- 7. Click Submit to complete your donation.

<u>Life Thoughts for Lutherans – October 2021</u>

October 3 – Pentecost XIX (Proper 22B) – This world idolizes sexuality so much it sacrifices unborn children in worship. Our Heavenly Father establishes boundaries to protect us from this slavery. He elevates us by connecting sexuality to marriage, intimacy, procreation, and family. Human bodies testify that we're born already belonging to somebody. Where the world sees selves for expressing or enjoying, we celebrate them in sharing and serving!

October 10 – Pentecost XX (Proper 23B) – "I would never choose it for myself, but I'm not comfortable telling anyone else how to act." Our neighbors need more from us than lukewarm. The Lord God invites the same courage and compassion His salvation has shown us. "Hate evil, and love good" (Amos 5:15). Real love proclaims both the Law and the Gospel directly (Mark 10:19-21). Jesus makes us nothing less than gentle but relentless!

October 17 – Pentecost XXI (Proper 24B) – Surprise pregnancy and terminal diagnosis can indeed make anyone feel vulnerable (Ecclesiastes 5:15). Our Incarnate Almighty knows (Hebrews 4:15), and so He arranges better solutions than intentional death. His promises have power even over problems of the body (Hebrews 4:12), and whatever losses we may suffer, He more than compensates (Mark 10:29-30). Jesus the Savior makes all things possible—even joy amid suffering (Ecclesiastes 5:18).

October 24 – Pentecost XXII (Proper 25B) – Disabilities do not deserve death, either at life's beginning or near its end. The Lord our God loves to save us in all our brokennesses (Jeremiah 31:8-9). May we learn something even greater than comfort from our limitations—may we learn in our disabilities to cry out to Jesus and follow Him (Mark 10:48, 52), through affliction to life everlasting.

October 31 – Pentecost XXIII (Proper 26B) – The grace of God doesn't prevail only in private. His life-giving words belong in bedrooms and on bodies (Deuteronomy 6:6-8), brought before congregations and into conversations for the sanctity of every human life. So, we do not keep these life-affirming convictions to ourselves because His blessings become even better when celebrating them with others (Deuteronomy 6:3).
