FROM THE PASTOR

Over the past couple of weeks, we have seen a nationwide trend of people kindling or re-kindling their connection to the Church. The recent murder of Charlie Kirk, who was a confessing Christian, is no doubt playing a role. We know from church history that when Christians were martyred the church often grew. In Acts 8:1 following the martyrdom of Stephen we saw a scattering of Christians in Jerusalem bringing the Gospel to people in surrounding regions. Consider what happened in Samaria after they had been scattered.

"But when they believed Philip as he preached good news about the kingdom of God and the name of Jesus Christ, they were baptized, both men and women." —Acts 8:12

It seems that for many, a secular life just isn't cutting it anymore. They yearn for something more, something objective, something really True. In the midst of a turbulent and dangerous world, the Church offers something altogether different. We do not skirt around the truth — we do not try to sugar-coat sin or death.

"...for all have sinned and fall short of the glory of God" — Romans 3:23

"...there is no one who does good, not even one." — Psalm 14:3b

"For the wages of sin is death, but the free gift of God is eternal life in Christ Jesus our Lord." — Romans 6:23

Instead we acknowledge sin and death for what they are and with vigor and zeal proclaim the greater truth that Jesus has conquered the both. We offer a better way, a way of grace, of forgiveness, and of true hope and peace. As Christians we pray that many more will come, confess their sins, and take hold of the forgiveness wrought for them by Jesus on the cross. That they will turn away from the idols of the flesh and find joy in living a Christian life of faith. Regardless of the circumstances or whatever the motivation, we rejoice when the Holy Spirit draws hearers to the Gospel.

I have been heartened to hear that many visitors feel welcomed at St. John's. But I think it is important to remind ourselves of the courage it takes to step foot in a church for the first time. You walk into an unfamiliar space, filled with many people you do not know, unsure of what to expect. It likewise takes courage to return to church where you have been delinquent. Guilt is often what keeps people from coming back to begin with, but even if they do return, that guilt does not go away the moment they enter the sanctuary. Consider again the Parable of the Prodigal Son. Upon seeing his son's return, the father responds with joy, running to him, demanding the fattened calf be killed and a feast prepared. The older son, who had faithfully served in his father's household for years, scorns the younger son.

"But when this son of yours who has squandered your property with prostitutes comes home, you kill the fattened calf for him!"— Luke 15:30

And the father finally responds —

"My son,' the father said, 'you are always with me, and everything I have is yours. But we had to celebrate and be glad, because this brother of yours was dead and is alive again; he was lost and is found." — Luke 15:31

Of course, we should all want to be like the father, and avoid the temptation to scorn those who return. None of us deserves what is given to us in the Divine Service regardless of how long we've been here or how regular our attendance is. And yet, our Lord gives it to us all by His grace. In this spirit of love and grace, here are a few tips to welcome both newcomers and returning sons.

- Pay Attention When you see someone new or returning, greet them, welcome them, and if they are sitting in your pew, graciously allow it. This may seem obvious, but it really does make a difference!
- Offer Help The Divine Service is not always intuitive, especially to those who have never been to church with a liturgical order of service. If you see someone who you can tell is unfamiliar with our service or the hymnal itself, offer to help, show them the hymn boards, point out things in the bulletin, or even offer to sit with them.
 - People who have young children are often concerned with the distraction they may cause. This is especially true with visitors or newcomers. Show them grace, and if they are willing, offer to help them. Never make it seem like they or their children are unwelcome. If it is necessary for them to leave with an unruly child, help guide them to the nursery in the undercroft.
 - 3. Invite Them If you personally know someone who is visiting or returning invite them to church functions personally, or perhaps, invite them to lunch or to your home for dinner. Show them Christian hospitality in whatever way you are able.

These are just a few things you can consider. Perhaps you can come up with some ideas yourself. Either way, I hope this is a good starting point for you as you continue to serve God and your neighbors in Christian hospitality, charity, grace, and love.

STEWARDSHIP CORNER – OCTOBER 2025

October 5 - Trinity 16

Ephesians 3:20-21 – "Now to him who is able to do far more abundantly than all that we ask or think, according to the power at work within us, to him be glory in the church and in Christ Jesus throughout all generations, forever and ever. Amen." God delights in exceeding expectations and in pouring out mercies in abundance. This truth stands in contrast to our fears about lacking what we need for "this body and life." We have an abundantly-blessing God who has proven His love for us on the cross. How could we not trust Him? How could we not respond to His love with generosity toward His mission in the church? How could we not have a desire to imitate Him in blessing others?

October 12 - Trinity 17

Luke 14:11 – "For everyone who exalts himself will be humbled, and he who humbles himself will be exalted." "The fear of the Lord is the beginning of wisdom" (Prov. 9:10). That's called humility. The Lord is God, and we are not. With that in mind, how could we not seek to follow His Word in all aspects of life? Once we see His love for us in the cross of Christ, how could we not trust Him? He knows what He is talking about, and we don't. He loves us and wants to bless us. If you believe that, then striking out on a path of faithfulness in the realm of stewardship is a lot easier. It just makes sense.

October 19 - Trinity 18

1 Corinthians 1:4 – "I give thanks to my God always for you because of the grace of God that was given you in Christ Jesus." The grace of God and thanksgiving go together. God has given us everything we possess and everything that we are. He is the Giver. Once we realize this, then thankfulness wells up inside of us. How could it not? And as Paul shows us here, it's not only the grace given to us individually that causes us to give thanks. It's even the grace given to others. We certainly have much to be thankful for when we look at the gifts of grace all around us. And how do we say thank you to the Lord? In any number of ways — in prayer, in sacrificial giving to His mission and in imitating His love and kindness to those around us.

October 26 - Reformation Day (Observed)

Revelation 14:6 – "Then I saw another angel flying directly overhead, with an eternal gospel to proclaim to those who dwell on earth, to every nation and tribe and language and people." During the Reformation, this text was used to refer to Luther's ministry and the Lutheran message. We have an eternal Gospel to proclaim. Christ has freed us from our sins without any works on our part. We are saved by grace alone! And, ironically enough, Luther said this should make him the "apostle of works." Once we are freed by grace, we are truly free to serve God in works that flow from thankfulness and praise.
