FROM OUR SEMINARIAN – JACOB STEFANEC

The Crucified King

St. Matthew's Gospel begins by calling Jesus "the son of David, the son of Abraham." The first is simple enough; to be the son of David is to be the King of Israel. God promised David—after all—that his throne would be established forever (2 Samuel 7:16). To be the son of David is to be his heir. To be his heir is to inherit his eternal throne. When one imagines a king and a throne, images of glory and splendor enter the mind. Fine clothing and a crown of gold are typical of such earthly kings. A throne placed within a great palace, surrounded by myriads of soldiers and servants at his command would be fitting for such a king.

But that's not the kind of king Jesus came to be. Not at all.

So, he is also called "the son of Abraham." Isaac was the son of Abraham. This is the promised son, who God commanded Abraham to sacrifice at Moriah. God said, "Take your son, your only son, whom you love, and go to the land of Moriah, and offer him there as a burnt offering," (Genesis 22:2). If David's son is the king, then Abraham's son is the sacrifice. The father is told to offer his son as a sacrifice, because the Father would offer his own "Beloved Son" in whom he is pleased as the Sacrifice for the sins of the world.

For Jesus, to be the King is to be the Sacrifice. They are not distinct, but the same. This is why he is not like the glorious earthly kings whose thrones and crowns are made of gold. The cross—the altar he is sacrificed upon for your sins—is his throne. Christ himself teaches this, saving, "Truly, I say to you, there are some standing here who will not taste death until they see the Son of Man coming in his kingdom," (Matthew 16:28). His kingdom in this verse clearly cannot be referring to his second coming, for many standing there would not "taste death" until they saw it. Jesus comes into his kingdom—where the forgiveness of sins is found—when he ascends the throne and altar of his cross. His crown is not made of gold, but of thorns that pierce his brow. His throne is not one in a palace, but is instead a tree to which he is nailed. There, the slaughtered lamb is the king on his throne, the son of Abraham is the son of David, and the Son of God is given unto death for all sin. Indeed, there he truly is the "KING OF THE JEWS," (Matthew 27:37).

This Holy Week, remember your king, who was sacrificed for you. Remember his agony and bloody sweat. Recall that your King is not like the kings of the earth. His kingdom is not an earthly one. It is instead the kingdom in which the forgiveness of sins is found, and you are in it—for he reigns in his church. As we approach Easter, we once again prepare to receive his crucified and glorified body and blood at his altar. So, remember that there the kingdom of heaven is yours, for the one sacrificed is yours.

STEWARDSHIP CORNER – APRIL 2024

April 7 – Easter 2 (Quasimodo geniti)

John 20:19 – "Jesus came and stood among them and said to them, 'Peace be with you." The peace we have in Jesus is what makes a life of good works possible. Since we know that it is Jesus who saved us, and not our works, we are now free to do good works not out of self-interest, but for the right reasons: out of thanksgiving toward God and love for our neighbors.

April 14 - Easter 3 (Misericordias)

John 10:14 – "I am the good shepherd. I know my own and my own know me." What does it mean to know the Lord? It starts with being known by the Lord: He claims us as His own and calls us by name. Then, once we are His, we learn to know Him, and in knowing Him, we learn to imitate Him. That is how the Christian life of good works and generosity grows from the Lord's grace.

April 21 – Easter 4 (Jubilate)

1 John 3:2 – "Beloved, we are God's children now, and what we will be has not yet appeared; but we know that when he appears we shall be like him, because we shall see him as he is." This is the essence of our sanctification: becoming like our Lord. As St. John notes, this will only be completed in the Resurrection. But until then, we are called to trust His grace and to grow into His image more and more.

April 28 - Easter 5 (Cantate)

James 1:17 – "Every good gift and every perfect gift is from above, coming down from the Father of lights." God is the source of all goodness. When we do good, therefore, we imitate Him and reflect His light to all the world. Christians give freely because God has first given so freely to us; we are only imitating our Father, growing up into His likeness.

<u>LIFE THOUGHTS FOR LUTHERANS –</u> APRIL 2024

Easter II – Our bodily life matters so much to God that He incarnated human flesh Himself. Even after accomplishing atonement by His body's brokenness, He did not discard it but inhabits it by resurrection as His eternal instrument (John 20:27). When we are physically suffering sin's consequences, our Savior's words of forgiveness breathe healing (John 20:21-23), and His ways of faith bring peace into our very bodies. Lord Jesus, let me take hold of You by faith until Your wounded and resurrected body redeems my own. Amen.

Easter III – The Good Shepherd lays down His life for the sheep (John 10:11-16). Herein lies our assurance that our Shepherd does not abandon His sheep. He loves them too much. He paid too much for them to forsake them. We live our lives, not in the absence of suffering, but in the presence of the Good Shepherd. Good Shepherd, thank You for laying down Your life for me. Amen.

Easter IV – The joy that comes from the risen Christ cannot be taken away (John 16:22). This is not a feel-good happiness dependent upon circumstances. It is a fruit of Christ's Spirit, the joy of our salvation in Christ that circumstances cannot change or diminish. Many of the life issues we deal with today are "joy robbers" and present opportunities to share the joy of the resurrection. Gracious Savior, fill my words with the comfort and hope of resurrection to everlasting life with You. Amen.

Easter V – Only the grace of God could supply as supreme a blessing as a mother's company and comfort. In the same way (John 16:7b), the Holy Spirit gives life and saves life even and especially when sorrow fills the heart (John 16:6). Indeed, the Word of forgiveness, joy, and hope He implants redeems both hopeless situations and helpless souls for everlasting celebration (James 1:21). Everpresent Redeemer, embrace us with Your Spirit until we trust Your truth, follow Your way, and enjoy Your life. Amen.
