FROM THE PASTOR

Observation of the Festival of Holy Innocents, Martyrs.

Following Christmas, the Church has long remembered three Christian martyrdoms. On December 26, the Festival of St. Stephen; on December 27, the Festival of St. John the Apostle; and on December 28 the Festival of the Holy Innocents, Martyrs.

Along with these observances it is often noted that St. Stephen was a martyr for Christ in both will and deed. St. John was a martyr in will, but not in deed. The Holy Innocents were martyrs not in will, but in deed.

It may seem rather strange to go immediately from the joyous celebration of Christmas directly into the sobering remembrance of Christian martyrdom. But it is actually quite appropriate. For it purposefully begs the question: "why does God allow such evil to exist"?

After the visit from the Magi, an angel of the Lord appeared to Joseph telling him to flee Bethlehem to Egypt. Herod, an evil and jealous man, had issued a command for his soldiers to kill every male child in Bethlehem. His orders were carried out and many young children were brutally murdered. Herod thought he had vanquished the one who threatened his power, but he was mistaken, and the blood of the innocents remained on his hands.

This story is recorded the Gospel of Matthew [2:13-18] where he shows us how this all was to fulfill what the Lord had spoken by the prophet, "Out of Egypt I called my son." And that the slaughter of the innocents was likewise predicted by the prophet Jeremiah where it is written: "A voice was heard in Ramah, weeping and loud lamentation, Rachel weeping for her children; she refused to be comforted, because they are no more."

When answering the question "why does God allow such evil to exist?" one must remember that God is <u>not</u> the author of evil. But it is likewise true that none of these events happened outside his permissive will. The same is true of the many evils that happen in our time. Abortion is one such atrocity that should come to mind as we remember the innocents slaughtered under Herod. Rest assured, God does not take death lightly, nor will he allow murderers to go unpunished. Paul reminds us in his letter to the Romans: "Dearly beloved, avenge not yourselves, but rather give place unto wrath: for it is written, vengeance is

mine; I will repay, saith the Lord." Herod, like Cain before him will receive their just condemnation.

Our Lord Jesus was not murdered by Herod as it was not the proper time. Jesus would lay down his life when and how he willed. And he did lay down his life, as he gave himself into the hands of evil murderous men. The slaughter of the Holy Innocents reminds us of the need we have for a savior from death and evil. It reminds us that death was vanguished by the death of the only Son of God. It reminds us that, at the cross, murderers were judged and the faithful vindicated. Death does not win, and murders do not go unpunished. It likewise gives words to the groaning of those who suffer the pain of loss, especially the loss of a dear child. Rachel's lament is familiar to anyone who has suffered such loss. But the one who was called out of Egypt brings us comfort. For he would indeed lay down his life; but he would also gloriously take it up again. Take comfort dear Christian in the promise of the resurrection. Heed the words of Christ our Lord who says to all you who weep: "I am the resurrection and the life. Whoever believes in me, though he die, vet shall he live, and everyone who lives and believes in me shall never die. Do you believe this?"

<u>LIFE THOUGHTS FOR LUTHERANS – JANUARY</u> 2023

Epiphany I/Baptism of Our Lord – John's baptism convicted every human being – "Jerusalem and all Judea" (Matthew 3:5-6). No physical incapacities excused anyone. Jesus' baptism consecrates every human being. God, in giving His Son, identifies with us at our weakest and embraces us at our worst. Even when we don't resemble anything our Maker intended, He doesn't call us "unwanted" or "better off dead." Instead He declares, "This is my beloved [child], with whom I am well pleased" (Matthew 3:17). In this newness of life, Christians can also welcome the least among us. Lord, construct Your kingdom of little ones like us. Amen.

Epiphany II – Perhaps we could raise the level of respect and honor for marriage if we focused less on what it isn't and more upon what it is, and teach, as Paul, that "it refers to Christ and the church" (Ephesians 5:32b). *Lord, help us see marriage as a picture of Your sacrificial and loving relationship to Your Church. Amen.*

Epiphany III

The Gospel (Romans 1:16) brought struggle to St. Paul, but God's grace also gave him unconditional worth and purpose. He could not help but rejoice to proclaim and perform it. Sometimes declaring the sanctity of human life sets us at odds with popular opinion and even our own loved ones. Yet we need not be ashamed. Indeed, we may be most excited to speak and share it, for Jesus makes us and every neighbor a precious treasure from fertilization to forever. Heavenly Father, fill us to overflowing with the courage and compassion of Your creating, redeeming, and calling. Amen.

Epiphany IV

The whole creation groans (Romans 8:22) because of sin's brokenness. Every life involves suffering, especially as last days draw near and bodies begin to fail. Still such circumstances have significance—our Lord describes them as the labor of childbirth. Jesus redeems our weaknesses to bear witness of a better life by His power that sustains us in our pain (Romans 8:18). Injuries, infections, and impairments only affect us as far as He permits (Matthew 8:26), and elderly and terminal lives matter eternally! *Almighty Maker, comfort us with community in You even as our flesh crumbles. Amen.*

Epiphany V

Abraham and God thought Lot's household worth having though they resided in Sodom (Genesis 18:23-32). Jesus dealt gently with fields of worthless weeds because He beheld the wheat He had hidden within (Matthew 13:29-30). Like surprise pregnancies and terminal diagnoses, there are inconvenient (and even evil) aspects about us all. If God desires and saves us still, how much more does the One Righteous Man's sacrifice make every human life a privilege, no matter what age, appearance, or ability! *Gracious Savior, lend us Your eyes to see past nuisance and receive every neighbor as gift. Amen.*

STEWARDSHIP CORNER

January 1 - Eve of the Name/Name of Jesus

Luke 2:21 – "And at the end of eight days, when he was circumcised, he was called Jesus, the name given by the angel before he was conceived in the womb." There it is: the shortest Gospel lesson of the whole Church Year. It is for the festival of the Circumcision and Name of Jesus. What more do you need to know than the name of Jesus — "the Lord saves." That's who Jesus is: the Lord who saves us sinners. That simple Gospel message is the foundation of our faith and the strength to live out our faith.

January 8 - Baptism of Our Lord

Matthew 3:15 – "But Jesus answered him, 'Let it be so now, for thus it is fitting for us to fulfill all righteousness." God sent His Son into the world to fulfill all righteousness for us, to do what we could not do. Here, Jesus plunges Himself into our sins and soaks them up in His Baptism, so that in our Baptism we might be cleansed and renewed. The whole of Jesus' life, everything He did and said, was one great offering to the Father in our stead to fulfill all righteousness for us. All our offerings back to our Lord are in thanksgiving for this one great, true offering.

January 15 – 2nd Sunday after Epiphany

Ephesians 5:27 – "...so that he might present the church to himself in splendor, without spot or wrinkle or any such thing, that she might be holy and without blemish." Our Lord has cleansed us with His blood — in His sight we are now pure and holy. He has given Himself, laying down His life for us. Now we are His spotless and beautiful bride. By His sacrifice, we are moved to sacrifice. By His cleansing, we find a desire to ourselves be clean and live blamelessly as He is blameless.

January 22 - 3rd Sunday after Epiphany

Matthew 8:8 – "But the centurion replied, 'Lord, I am not worthy to have you come under my roof, but only say the word, and my servant will be healed." The Word of the Lord is powerful and effective. What God says, goes. "Let there be light" (Gen. 1:3). And there was light. His Word is still effective and creative for us: "This is my body, which is given for you" (Luke 22:19). "Your sins are forgiven" (Matt. 9:2, Luke 5:20, etc.). This is why it is no burden for us to live according to the Word of God: we know that His Word is always aimed at our blessing.

January 29 - Transfiguration

Matthew 17:8 – "And when they lifted up their eyes, they saw no one but Jesus only." Jesus is enough. Moses and Elijah point to Jesus and are happy to fade into the background. With our eyes focused on Him and Him alone, the rest of our lives come into focus. He is primary, all else secondary. When that order is right in our lives, things truly fall into place.
