FROM THE PASTOR

From the Pastor

This month we continue to focus on those whom we commemorate in the Lutheran Church throughout the year. In the month of March, those remembered are two sixteenth century artists named Lucas Cranach and Albrecht Dürer (Apr 6), a somewhat familiar name here at St. John's of Pastor Johannes Bugenhagen (Apr 20), the theologian Anselm of Canterbury (Apr 21), and Johann Walter, a church musician (Apr 24) [*LSB* xii].

Lucas Cranach lived from 1472-1557 and served as the court painter for the Electors of Saxony. Living as a believer in the time of the Reformation, he became good friends with Martin Luther and offered his artistic talents to further his teachings. There is a print of one of Cranach's most famous works downstairs in our Fellowship Hall. The work itself was the altarpiece at the Lutheran Church of St. Peter and Paul in Weimar, Germany. Cranach himself is represented in the artwork, and the blood from Christ's pierced side is landing on his head. This points to the beautiful promise that the blood He shed for us covers all of our sin. It is also of note that Cranach began this work but died before completing it. His son, Lucas Cranach the Younger, finished the work on this altarpiece. Be sure to look at it this Sunday during the Bible Class!

Albrecht Dürer lived from 1471-1528 and was not as directly associated with the Lutheran reformers as Cranach. Being familiar with Luther and his work, Dürer had a desire to paint a portrait of him in order to preserve his likeness and memory. His woodcuts, depicting various scenes from the Scriptures or offering small visual representations of important Lutheran teachings can be found in a recent printing of the Book of Concord known as *Concordia: The Lutheran Confessions* (2006). His most famous work is the drawing known as "Praying Hands."

Pastor Johannes Bugenhagen lived from 1485-1558. He was a devoted Lutheran theologian and pastor during the time of the Reformation, and served as Luther's pastor. He officiated at Luther's wedding and also at his funeral.

Bugenhagen, whose selected works were translated and published in a two-volume set in 2015, is known for offering practical reform in both the church and the school. This is what motivated the name behind the Bugenhagen Conference, sponsored in part by St. John's and often hosted here each year. The conference itself was established in 2018 to provide more in terms of strengthening pastors in their day-to-day work and also to build a camaraderie and brotherhood among the pastors who attend, similar to what Bugenhagen and Luther enjoyed in their life together. Thank you for your continued support of this conference!

Johann Walter, a Lutheran church musician and contemporary of Luther, lived from 1496-1570. He began studying music at the age of 21 and shortly after he committed himself to the Lutheran faith. He published the first Lutheran hymnal in 1524. He served as cantor for most of his life in Torgau, Germany. His musical contributions to the faith are continued to be seen and used today, most notably the hymn "The Bridegroom Soon Will Call Us" (*LSB* 514).

God's blessings as we make our way together through the month of April, which will include our joyful celebration of Christ's resurrection on Sunday, April 17!

Life Thoughts for Lutherans – APRIL 2022

Lent V (Judica) - God's gifts do not always make immediate human sense (John 8:48, 53, 57). What remains certain regardless is that God is good and God gives. The Father who eternally gives Himself to the Son (John 8:42) and the Son who offers Himself to the Father in appreciative obedience (John 8:55) are the Holy Trinity who imparts this life-giving Spirit even where only death appears possible (Genesis 22:10). Trusting His Word and work releases from death's threatening grip (John 8:51, Genesis 22:13). Father, Son, and Spirit, guide us to trust Your Gospel that we may share in Your abundant life. Amen.

Annunciation of Our Lord - Whose life matters most? Every human being matters down to the teeniest and feeblest, since God made sure to incarnate Himself as embryo in Mary's womb and then became completely helpless in crucified execution. How much do they matter? So much that Jesus redeemed them each and all, with His lifeblood as the price. Lord Jesus Christ, bring forth Your name from our lips so that it draws all people to You. Amen.

Palm Sunday - In the midst of the darkness and forsakenness of that Friday we now call Good, we see God "hiding" in it all, demonstrating His love in a way we cannot comprehend but only apprehend by faith. The passion of Christ assures us that God works in our darkness demonstrating His love, bringing good, and promising never to forsake. Lord Jesus, redeem all our fallenness by Your humility, compassion, forgiveness, and company. Amen.

Easter Sunday - The resurrected Jesus first appeared to a very sinful, formerly demon-possessed woman, Mary Magdalene. The hope of the resurrection is for those hopelessly lost in their sins. In one sense, we could say that this hope is especially for those who are-like the rest of us-hopelessly lost! Thanks be to God! Heavenly Father, draw me into rejoicing in Jesus' resurrection and the value it gives to all humankind. Amen.

Easter II - Our bodily life matters so much to God that He incarnated human flesh Himself. Even after accomplishing atonement by His body's brokenness, He did not discard it but inhabits it by resurrection as His eternal instrument (John 20:27). When we are physically suffering sin's consequences, our Savior's words of forgiveness breathe healing (John 20:21-23), and His ways of faith bring peace into our very bodies. Lord Jesus, let me take hold of You by faith until Your wounded and resurrected body redeems my own. Amen.
