FROM THE PASTOR

The Psalter

This year we have chosen to focus on appointed psalms for our day school chapel services and for our midweek evening services. The importance of the Psalter cannot be overstated or overlooked. If you do not have a devotional habit, a great place to start is with the Psalter. Begin reading them devotionally and you will find in them beauty and insight, wisdom and instruction, law and gospel. You will hear musings on the wonder of God's creation, words of lament and sorrow, along with words of faith and abiding trust in the Lord. Martin Luther, for his part, loved the Psalter. He learned to make it his daily devotional tool and indeed was a key for him to understand the rest of Holy Scripture. It is likewise true that the Psalms are not intended only to be read silently, but heard out loud, and even sung. Every Sunday we sing the Introit which usually contains segments of thematically appropriate psalms. For chapel services we are having the children read the psalms out loud. These words are not only meant to be heard like a lesson but are also to be on our lips and in our hearts.

As you read the psalms you will notice that each one has a different theme. Luther gives us a guide to five different themes which I will outline here. The first are psalms of prophecy, which usually contain messianic predictions and laments which align with the ministry of Christ or with a particular eye toward the eschaton (the end times). Think, for example, of Psalm 22 "My God, my God, why have you forsaken me?" words which were on the lips of Jesus on the cross and as the psalm goes on, you'll see even more words which are particularly prophetic of Jesus' crucifixion. The second are psalms of instruction, which teach us things to do and things to avoid and often point to the folly of the wisdom of man in light of the true wisdom of God. The third are psalms of comfort, which point to the everlasting peace that comes through faith in an almighty and merciful God. The fourth are psalms of prayer, which teach us how we are to pray especially in times of hardship. The fifth are psalms of thanks, where we are taught to glorify God in all that he has done for us in body and spirit.

And so, I encourage you, as you are able, to spend time in the psalms. Read them aloud or sing them if you are able. In your hymnal they are pointed to be sung, and you will find before the psalter an index of the different tones you may use. Many of them should be familiar to you as we sing them in church, moving through them seasonally. May the Lord continue to bless you as you hear, meditate, and respond with faith and thanksgiving to the blessings found in the Psalter.

NEW POLICY UPDATE

Act 20 3rd grade promotion policy (This would be its own policy or added to our current retention/promotion policy.)

Wisconsin Act 20 mandates all schools in Wisconsin adopt a promotion policy for students progressing from 3rd to 4th grade based on his/her reading proficiency as evidenced through a nationally normed reading assessment. St. John's Lutheran students who score more than one year below grade level norms on the MAP reading assessment in 1st-3rd grade will receive intervention that may include, but is not limited to, the following: small group instruction, reteaching using the St. John's prescribed curriculum, Title services, and/or referral to a summer school program. Students will receive intervention until MAP assessment scores are within one year of the student's assigned grade level at St. John's or until the exceptions below are met. Parents will be notified of the criteria used to determine the need for intervention and the plan for support. Students who are not performing at grade level on the 3rd grade nationally normed reading assessment will receive intervention as explained above and may be retained in 3rd grade per state law.

The following students are exempt from this Act 20 policy in accordance with the law:

- Limited-English pupils as defined in s.115.955
- Pupils with IEPs who have been exempted because taking such assessments are not appropriate for the pupil
- A pupil who scores as proficient on an alternative assessment approved by DPI
- A pupil with an IEP or 504 plan that indicates the pupil received more than 2 years of intensive intervention and was previously retained
- A pupil who received more than 2 years of intensive intervention and was previously retained

STEWARDSHIP CORNER OCTOBER 2024

Oct. 6 – Trinity 19

Ephesians 4:24 – "Put on the new self, created after the likeness of God in true righteousness and holiness." The battle between the old self in Adam and the new self in Christ is fought in the heart and mind of every Christian. Paul encourages us to put on the new man which is created in the image of God. Our sanctification, our growth in godliness, is a growth into God's image. So we do this by keeping our eyes on Christ and imitating Him in everything: in love, in kindness, in self-giving generosity. Oct. 13 – Trinity 20

Isaiah 55:2 – "Why do you spend your money for that which is not bread, and your labor for that which does not satisfy?" What Isaiah says here is reminiscent of what Jesus says about putting our earthly wealth in places where "moth and rust destroy" (Matt. 6:19). Where we put the money God has given us to manage says a lot about the way in which we actually view life. What do your spending priorities say about what you think is truly important in life?

Oct. 20 - Trinity 21

Genesis 1:1 – "In the beginning God created ..." Many studies report that atheism is on the rise in our culture. The appeal of atheism is in the denial of a Creator. If the world just happens to exist, and we are just accidents that arose out of a long process of random, directionless evolution, then we get to make our own rules, and nobody has any right to tell us otherwise. Because if there is a Creator, then obviously He would know best, and we would do best, to follow His commands. Of course, we Christians know this Creator very well, and we have seen not only His power and commands, but also His grace and mercy in His Son, our Lord Jesus Christ.

Oct. 27 - Reformation Day

Romans 3:20 – "For by works of the law no human being will be justified in His sight, since through the law comes knowledge of sin." The Law of God is good — it's just that we sinners cannot save ourselves by the Law. Salvation is a free gift of God because that is the only way we could ever be saved. The Law shows us God's holiness and thus our own sin. And now in Christ we can look at the Law and see it in a new light as well: as a guide for how to live a godly life in thanksgiving to God for His gracious forgiveness in Christ.

<u>LIFE THOUGHTS FOR LUTHERANS –</u> OCTOBER 2024

Trinity XIX – The horror of abortion happening over 3,000 times each day in the U.S. should make Christians angry. The silence of the Church and the indifference of fellow congregational members should make Christians angry. But anger must not lead us to sin (Ephesians 4:26). Screaming and yelling and returning evil for evil is not the way of the body of Christ. The truth needs to be proclaimed but without "bitterness and wrath" (4:31).

Trinity XX/Reformation Sunday -Reformation truths Lutherans have celebrated for 500 years apply beautifully and powerfully to life issues. A human being's identity and sanctity come from God's grace in creating, redeeming, each one. **Abilities** calling accomplishments, efforts or emotions cannot establish anyone's value or invalidate anyone's worth. Prayer: Gracious Savior, let us honor with You the preciousness of every human person because of Your grace, forgiveness, and free salvation. Amen.

Trinity XXI — The picture of the armor-clad Christian in Ephesians 6:10-20 is one of defense not offense. We are not fighting to obtain truth. We have the truth. We fight to defend the truth upon which we stand. Be encouraged in this spiritual battle that can seem so frustrating at times. "[B]e strong in the Lord and in the strength of his might" (6:10). Prayer: Thank You for Your truth, Lord, and Your armor. Help us stand firm. Amen.

Trinity XXII – God would have us forgive each other "from your heart" (Matthew 18:35). When terrible sins are involved, such as abuse or incest, it is no easy matter to forgive—maybe it even seems impossible. The same is true when trying to forgive ourselves when we have committed some horrible sin, like abortion, for example. The starting point for forgiveness in all situations is not what we should do but what God in Christ has done for us. Only His complete forgiveness can give us peace as we strive to forgive others and ourselves. Prayer: Father, forgive our many sins for Jesus' sake and give us opportunity to share this forgiveness freely with others. Amen.
